Laos, much like many other Mekong countries, primarily relies agriculture, with the majority of the population residing in rural areas engaged in farming activities. The increasing demand for food and the challenges posed by climate change have made traditional sun drying methods effective. conventional open sundry techniques, while cost-effective straightforward, present contamination risks, uncertainties related to weather, and result in poor-quality dried products. This has a direct impact on the income of farmers and SMEs, especially during the rainy season.

Rice noodle and banana production, crucial elements of Laotian agriculture, suffer during the rainy season, leading to reduced incomes and post-harvest losses due to the longer days required techniques. open sundry Recognizing the need for sustainable solutions, the project on Solar Drying,

, supported by the Mekong-Republic of Cooperation Fund (MKCF), initiated a transformative project led by the Lao Research Institute for Energy and Mines. This project aims to reshape the agricultural landscape by applying innovative solar drying technology.

Focusing on the prolonged preservation of agricultural products, such as corn, dryers for agricultural and ODOP bananas, and rice noodles under the products can result in improved One District One Project (ODOP) product quality, extended shelf life, initiative, the project introduces solar increased value, reduced losses, drying techniques.
